GEORGIA

Mitchell Young Anderson Museum on 319 Oak Street in Thomasville, Georgia, is the historical product of what Reconstruction was intended to be throughout the south. People born as slaves, freed after the Civil War, learned new skills because of money brought to Thomasville by wealthy northerners and who, over time, became the first generation of the African American Middle Class. This money also rebuilt the town, making white citizens financially secure, thus lowering racial tensions that raged throughout the south.

In keeping with the interests of Jule Anderson, the last family member to own the house, the museum has established a movie theatre to show movies produced by African Americans which date to the early 20th century as well as films produced throughout the African Diaspora.

Connect with the nature of Baja California, Mexico, to energize your learning for the school year ahead and delve into resources to connect your students with the ocean. Both formal and informal educators are welcome.

Explore Bahia de los Angeles in the San Felipe Desert from both the water and land. Snorkel the turquoise waters, rich with sea life. Swim with whale sharks and sea lions in the Sea of Cortez. Discover the UNESCO designated World Heritage Site as a priority conservation area and its extraordinary diversity of marine life. Conservation is a key component of this trip and participants will be engaged with a conservation project in the field. Cost: \$1,995 + airfare to San Diego (Travel to San Diego not included).
