It always takes me a while to really process everything I heard and learned. It was so exciting to reunite with members of the Sunny Southeast all the way out there in California!

One of the best parts of each workshop or conference I attend is the chance to reconnect with other interpreters in the field. I love hearing about what other people are doing at their sites and how they're reaching their audience. A conference is a chance for an "interpretive recharge", where we can think about what interpretation means to us and decide how we want to connect with the visitors at our sites.

What is interpretation? What does it mean? According to a quick Google search, interpretation is defined as "the action of explaining the meaning of something." If you ask someone outside of our field, it is the act of translating one language to another. Tilden himself states that to "resort to the dictionary for a competent definition is fruitless." However, NAI has offered a new definition which states, "Interpretation is a purposeful approach to communication that facilitates meaningful, relevant, and inclusive experiences that deepen understanding, broaden perspectives, and inspire engagement with the world around us."

I believe interpretation does mean translation, but not of languages. Instead, as an interpreter of the natural world, I'm transforming local flora and fauna into ideas, feelings, and experiences. Would you rather listen to a lecture about logging or take a walk in woods to discover why some trees are marked and not others? By providing visitors with tangible and enjoyable experiences, I can help a person translate their relationship to nature and in turn, help lend meaning to that relationship.

In what ways do you translate at your site? How do you keep your interpretive tool bag a fun resource to dive into again and again? If you're losing steam, consider signing up for a local training or workshop to help recharge your interpretive battery. It always works for me! And as always, know that your regional leadership team is here to support you.

Remembering Doctor Frank H. Wadsworth 1915-2022



Founder of the Santa Ana Nature Center in the Julio E. Monagas National Park, Frank H. Wadsworth earned his doctorate in forestry from the University of Michigan and is considered a world authority on tropical forests.

His greatest legacy was with the Boy Scouts of America and his dedication to Guajataka Scout Camp. In 1952 he created the Nature Team as

In 1952 he created the Nature Team as part of the summer camp staff. From there, he began to train young people in the areas of trees, birds, astronomy, and conservation.

Many of those young people today are nature interpreters, managers or conservationists who continue his legacy
